### A) Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Monthly Report

Constable Gary Wojciechowski reviewed the March OPP Report for the Board and discussions were held on the following matters:

- 1 false alarm call officers attended the address. There were no duplicate addresses as per the Shuniah's false alarm policy.
- Officers responded to a 26-year-old suicidal female. The mother advised the daughter had cut herself on her arm and calf and also had thoughts of killing the mother. The female was transported to the Thunder Bay Regional Health Science Center for a mental health assessment.
- Officers attended a fire at a residence and observed a shed to be on fire with the owner attempting to put it out with a garden hose. Shuniah Fire Department was dispatched & extinguished the fire without incident. The owner intentionally set the shed on fire trying to clean up his yard. Shuniah Fire charged the owner.
- total calls for Service were 41 to April 2017 compared to 55 in 2016

As part of the implementation of the new regulation, O. Reg. 58/16: Collection Of Identifying Information In Certain Circumstances - Prohibition And Duties, that came into effect on January 1, 2017, the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services is launching a multi-year research study to assess the impact of collecting identifying information.

The multi-year research study will examine data prior to and post-implementation of the new regulation and will include an assessment of:

- the effectiveness of the practice of police-public non-investigative interactions, where identifying information is collected in preventing and solving crime; and,
- whether any particular groups (i.e. members of a racialized group) are disproportionately reflected in police-public non-investigative interactions, where identifying information is collected.

The ministry is working in partnership with Statistics Canada to conduct the multi-year research study. Statistics Canada will bring significant internationally recognized expertise and robust analytical capacity, as well as a 'national landscape' perspective. By utilizing the analytical methodology developed for the 're-contact' project, Statistics Canada will be able to link to other data sources like the UCR/Census/National Household Survey. This approach will provide a 'complete story' by allowing for the research findings to be presented in the context of socio-demographic and neighbourhood-level information, and will account for individuals' criminal history pre and post- interaction.

In order to inform the parameters of the study, the initial steps include ascertaining the volume and content of police-public non-investigative interactions where identifying information is collected (i.e., CIICC data).

The ministry has prepared a short web-based survey to assess total number of occurrences (volume of CIICC interactions) for 2014 and 2015 calendar years (or the last two complete years of data available). Police services are being asked to provide aggregate information only.

Additionally, the ministry is seeking to identify two police services, one Versaterm client and one NICHE client, to provide relevant information to conduct a detailed data review (5 years of data). The two police services will work with the ministry to:

- identify all data variables related to police-public non-investigative interactions (e.g., personal identifiers, ethnicity indicator, reason for interaction, date and time of interaction, interaction location information, and post-stop activities, such as searches, contraband found, citations, etc.);
- develop a script to extract the data; and,
- provide the data extract to the ministry.

This will assist in validation of consistency of the data; assessment of operational definitions related to CIICC interactions recorded in the RMS; as well as review of narratives contained within the police data to identify indicators of ethnicity and reasons for the interactions.

Upon completion of the scoping work by Statistics Canada, all police services will be asked to provide historical CIICC data. Furthermore, starting in early spring of 2018, all police services will be required (on an ongoing basis) to provide annual post-implementation CIICC data.



Re-Suspensions**

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The Ministry of Transportation has become aware that a small number of drivers may have had their licences re-suspended despite already paying outstanding fines.

A delay in communication between computer systems at the Ministries of Transportation and the Attorney General has caused the incomplete total amounts owing to be recorded on a driver's record, and the driver's licence to be re-suspended.

We are actively working to resolve this matter and are treating it with urgent and top priority. Immediate and corrective action has been taken for the drivers that had been re-suspended. Until a permanent fix is made to our systems, no further fine updates will be shared between ministry systems to ensure that no additional drivers are improperly suspended.

If police officers face this issue at roadside I would encourage them to contact the Driver Improvement Office at 416-235-4250 to verify if the driver in question is impacted by this system issue.

In June of last year, the Ombudsman of Ontario released his report: “A Matter of Life and Death: Investigation into the direction provided by the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services to Ontario’s police services for de-escalation of conflict situations”.

The ministry continues to actively work to respond to the Ombudsman’s 22 recommendations. A tiered, stakeholder-centred project structure has been implemented to support this work. The structure is led by an Executive Advisory Committee to provide strategic advice and recommendations to the ministry. Membership includes representatives that bring a variety of perspectives, including policing, mental health, psychology, civil liberties, and justice.

The Executive Advisory Committee will receive input and review proposals from subject matter experts through an Expert Technical Table. In addition to police training experts, the membership includes representatives with a community-based mental health perspective.

As you know, the ministry issued a grant to the University of Toronto for research led by Dr. Judith Andersen and her team, to assist with ensuring an arm’s-length, scientific review and evidence-based approach to this work.

As part of the information-gathering phase of this project, Dr. Andersen and her team continue to reach out to police services for their assistance. More recently, a survey link was sent to all services requesting that all front line officers complete the survey. **SUBJECT:** **Tow Trucks and Commercial Vehicle Operator's  
Registration (CVOR)**

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As communicated in December 2016, regardless of weight, tow trucks have been added to the definition of 'commercial motor vehicle', and are now included in the group of vehicles that require a CVOR certificate. These changes came into force on January 1, 2017.

Since then, Ministry of Transportation enforcement officers have been providing an education period for operators who have applied for a CVOR certificate but have not yet received it.

**The educational period will be ending May 31, 2017.** All tow truck operators are expected to complete the application process and have a valid CVOR certificate in their possession by that time.

As previously communicated, further requirements for tow trucks under the *Highway Traffic Act* (HTA) will be phased in over time. However, in this initial phase, the following HTA requirements will **not** be applicable to tow trucks:

- **Hours of Service (HTA Section 190 and Regulation 555/06)**
  - Daily log (completing, carrying, surrendering)
  - Daily requirements
  - Shift requirements
  - Cycle requirements
  - Recordkeeping requirements for those drivers not required to carry a daily log
  - Retention of documents by operator

- **Daily inspections and associated recordkeeping (HTA Section 107 and Regulation 199/07)**
  - Establishment of a maintenance and inspection program by the operator
  - Daily inspection reports (completing, carrying, surrendering and forwarding to the operator)
  - Inspection schedule (providing, carrying, surrendering)
  - Prescribed defects (reporting to the operator, prohibition of driving with major defect)
  - Retention of documents by operator

**Note:** The requirements for tow trucks with a gross weight (actual), registered gross weight or manufacturer's Gross Vehicle Weight Rating greater than 4,500 kg to have an annual inspection and display a yellow inspection decal have **not** changed.

- **Entering truck inspection stations while lights flashing**

**Note:** Tow trucks are subject to roadside inspections, targeted inspections or scheduled inspections by MTO enforcement officers or police.

**Note:** The requirement to enter inspection station if operating under an over dimensional/overweight permit has not changed.

Additional changes introduced in subsequent phase(s) will be shared with the policing community.

Reg. 58/16: Collection Of Identifying Information In Certain Circumstances - Prohibition And Duties, that came into effect on January 1, 2017, the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services launched a multi-year research study to assess the impact of collecting identifying information.

In order to inform the parameters of the study, the initial steps include ascertaining the volume and content of police-public non-investigative interactions where identifying information is collected (i.e., CIICC data).

On May 10, 2017, an All Chiefs Memorandum (index no.: 17-0037) requested that all police services complete a short web-based survey to assess total number of occurrences (volume of CIICC interactions) for 2014 and 2015 calendar years (or the last two complete years of data available).

The original closing date of the survey was June 1, 2017. Thus far not all police services were able to complete the survey, and as such the **closing date has been extended until June 9, 2017.**

The completion of this survey is a crucial initial step to launching the multi-year research study, and all police services are asked to complete the survey.

The Ontario Government has announced its appointment of the Honourable Michael Tulloch, a judge of the Ontario Court of Appeal, to lead the independent review of the implementation of Ontario Regulation 58/16: *Collection of Identifying Information in Certain Circumstances – Prohibition and Duties*, which came into effect on January 1, 2017.

As part of this review, Justice Tulloch will make recommendations on all aspects of the use of carding or street checks and whether options exist to improve the implementation of the regulation. The focus of this review will be on:

- The consistent application of the regulation without bias or discrimination;
- Compliance by police officers and chiefs of police when applying the regulation;
- Challenges encountered in applying the regulation;
- Appropriateness of the accountability and oversight mechanisms of the regulation; and,
- Whether additional changes are necessary to improve the practice of street checks, or whether street checks are still necessary in today's policing practices.

Justice Tulloch will also work in consultation with Ontario's Anti-Racism Directorate to examine whether the continued use of street checks by police services and the regulation properly reflects the government's plan to eliminate systemic racism. His final report will be made public by January 1, 2019.
