### OPP COMMISSIONER HAWKES HONOUR AWARD RECIPIENTS AT CEREMONY

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) hosted an annual award ceremony in Thunder Bay on Wednesday October 17, 2018 for North West Region OPP employees and community members who were recognized for various acts and achievements.

The North West Region Awards are part of a series of award ceremonies held by the OPP every year to recognize various people in each of its regions. Among those recognized are OPP uniformed and civilian members, as well as community members who have demonstrated outstanding achievement, dedication, perseverance, innovation and an overall commitment to the OPP and the communities they serve. Employees who have reached service milestones are also recognized.

Among the recipients to whom Commissioner Vince Hawkes presented awards, were members of the Pellatt Fire Department who rescued a husband and wife who had gone through the ice on Sandy Lake in Kenora. Their quick thinking and teamwork saved two lives that day. Also an off duty Nipigon OPP officer who while out fishing on Lake Superior came across two intoxicated subjects in a sailboat. One of the men fell into the lake and was in distress, the officer pulled the subject from the icy waters and placed both men under arrest for impaired operation of a vessel. A First Nations Constable received a Commissioners Letter and St. John Ambulance award for performing CPR on a suicide victim. He was able to revive the subject which allowed them to be transported to a Winnipeg hospital. Two civilians received a Commissioner's Citation for Lifesaving for coming to the rescue of an overdue motorist who rolled his vehicle in a snowstorm and was trapped inside with no heat for over 16 hours. Their actions that night saved a life.

## TWO TRIPLE FATALITY ROAD COLLISIONS, NUMEROUS TRAFFIC CHARGES LAID OVER THANKSGIVING WEEKEND

In one of the deadliest Thanksgiving weekends in recent history, two triple fatality collisions were among the four fatal road incidents that claimed a total of eight (8) lives on OPP-patrolled roads.

All four incidents occurred on Saturday, October 6, 2018. The first crash occurred near Port Perry and involved two vehicles in which three people died and two others were injured. The second collision that also claimed three lives and involved two vehicles occurred near Guelph.

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The other two fatalities were the result of two separate road crashes, one in Elgin County and the other in Brant County.

On Friday, October 5, 2018, the OPP wrapped up its Fall Seat Belt Campaign (September 26 - October 5, 2018) just as they geared up for the national Operation Impact Campaign (October 5 - 8, 2018).

The OPP laid 2,475 seat belt charges during the ten-day Seat Belt Campaign.

During Operation Impact, which targeted aggressive, inattentive and alcohol/drug impaired drivers as well as unbuckled occupants, the OPP laid 6,934 charges. The majority of the charges (5,295) were issued to drivers who were speeding (see breakdown of charges below).

The OPP is reminding the motoring public that safe driving is the single most effective way to reduce the number of deaths and injuries on our roads.

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### OPP REPORTS 156 ROAD DEATHS ATTRIBUTED TO BIG FOUR

As of October 1, 2018 the deaths of 156 people on Ontario Provincial Police-(OPP)-patrolled roads were linked to the "Big Four" leading contributing factors in road fatalities. These are aggressive driving, alcohol/drug impaired driving, inattentive driving and lack of seat belt use.

So far this year, 50 deaths were linked to speeding (one form of aggressive driving). Thirty seven (37) deaths were attributed to an inattentive driver and 35 deaths involved a driver who had consumed alcohol and/or drugs. Failure to wear a seat belt was a factor in 34 people losing their lives in collisions on OPP-patrolled roads.

Over the Thanksgiving Long Weekend, the OPP joined police partners across Canada for *Operation Impact*, an enforcement-driven initiative aimed at increasing public compliance with laws in place to save lives and reduce injuries on our roads.

"So far this year, the OPP has laid more than 175,155 charges against aggressive, inattentive, alcohol and drug-impaired drivers, and unbuckled vehicle occupants. The three behaviours associated with driving are linked to 15,269 collisions to date, 95 of which were fatal. The goal of *Operation Impac*t is not about issuing traffic tickets. It is about seeing every driver, without police intervention, refrain from risky driving behaviours and every vehicle occupant buckled up."

### DID YOU KNOW?

*Operation Impact* is an annual initiative sponsored by the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police.

Operation Impact is part of Canada's broader Road Safety Strategy 2025 which aims to make Canada's roads the safest in the world.

Drug-impaired and alcohol-impaired driving have always been illegal and this will not change once Cannabis becomes legal on October 17, 2018.

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### <u>POLICE IN ONTARIO CONDUCT HUMAN TRAFFICKING OUTREACH THROUGH</u> OPERATION NORTHERN SPOTLIGHT

### OPP Coordinated Investigations in Ontario

Members of police services throughout Ontario were able to ensure the safety of seven people who were in exploitative situations, including two under the age of 18 as a result of *Operation Northern Spotlight*, a coordinated, national effort to end human trafficking.

Over a seven-day period, 45 police services across Ontario participated in the operation. Forty-five charges were laid against 15 people. A total of 317 police officers, support staff and victim services professionals engaged with 218 potential victims, as part of a joint effort coordinated by the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP). This was part of a national operation in partnership with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP). Collaboration among police services is extremely important due to the multi-jurisdictional nature of human trafficking.

### Of the seven victims identified:

- Two were recovered by Peel Regional Police Service
- One was recovered by Waterloo Regional Police Service
- Three were recovered by Ottawa Police Service
- One was recovered by Niagara Regional Police Service

During *Operation Northern Spotlight*, police meet with individuals suspected of being in exploitative situations. They are provided contacts and information for community-based support agencies and are offered both immediate and future police assistance to leave the exploitation. The program is not intended to engage those who are not being exploited.

Charges include: Obtaining Sexual Services for Consideration, Failure to Comply with Condition of Undertaking or Recognizance, Forcible Confinement, Trafficking in Persons, Material Benefit - Trafficking, Material Benefit from Sexual Services, Procuring, Assault with a Weapon, Aggravated Assault, Assault Causing Bodily Harm, Assault, Pointing a Firearm, Possession of a Weapon for Dangerous Purpose, Criminal Harassment, Uttering Threats, Failing to report contrary to Christopher's Law (Sex offender Registry), Fail to Comply with SOIRA Order, Identity Fraud, Obstruct a Public Officer or Peace Officer, Possession of Property Obtained by Crime, Youth Criminal Justice Act: 137 - Fail to Comply with Sentence or Disposition.

### ABOUT THE CANINE UNIT

The OPP Canine unit was formed in 1965, at which time only three teams were trained to provide support services to all of the OPP and other law enforcement agencies across the province. There are currently 27 teams, each team consisting of a dog and a handler. There are also an additional 16 dogs trained for specific detection duties.

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Each team is stationed at strategic points throughout the province, providing canine support for search and rescue, tracking wanted persons, detecting narcotics, searching for cadavers, as well as firearms, explosives and physical evidence. Canine teams are also involved in community service work, fundraising, and public demonstrations.
