#### 2023 Budget and Property Taxes

The Council of the Municipality of Shuniah has ratified the municipal budget for 2023 which sets out the new tax rates and provides the approval to move forward with operating services and capital projects for the coming year. In these times of significant inflation and rising interest rates, our goal was to minimize the impact of property tax increases while ensuring that Municipal services are properly funded. The Municipality also needs to forecast for future commitments by preparing a multi-year budget that focuses on sustainability and includes reserves for infrastructure and potential fluctuations in operating expenditures. Administration published the Draft Budget on the Shuniah website on December 22nd that included a detailed line-byline budget, draft budget memo, a 10-year summary of revenues, expenses and reserves, 10-year capital budgets for both Fire and Roads and a memo from Public Works on 2023 projects for roads, bridges, recreation centre and waste disposal sites. All of these reports are still accessible by visiting our website at shuniah.org, select 'Agendas and Minutes' and select the Jan 10th Special Budget meeting in the calendar. Council passed by-law 3281-23 on January 31st to adopt the 2023 budget and rates of taxation.

#### The 2023 Shuniah Budget includes a 3.41% tax levy increase.

While the total 2023 levy increase is 3.41%, we attribute approximately 0.5% to growth in new property assessment (new construction) within Shuniah. The net increase to the Municipal Levy (after growth) if comparing to other Municipalities is approximately **2.91%**.

Overall, the 2023 municipal tax levy of \$5.4 million represents an increase of \$178,000 over 2022. The tax levy is the total amount needed from property taxpayers to fund municipal services and contribute to capital programs. It is important to note that the levy increase of \$178,000 for the year 2023 is independent of the increase in property values. If the property values, assessed and provided form MPAC, in-

#### Shuniah Fire & Emergency Services **Refrigerator Fire Safety**

Refrigerators are an essential appliance in most homes and businesses. However, they can also be a potential fire hazard if they are not properly maintained. Here are some fire safety messages regarding refrigerator maintenance to prevent fires:

- 1. Regularly clean the coils: The coils at the back of your refrigerator collect dust and debris over time, which can cause the compressor to overheat and potentially start a fire. Clean the coils at least once every six months to keep them clear of debris.
- 2. Avoid overloading the refrigerator: Overloading your fridge with too many items can obstruct airflow and cause the compressor to work harder than it needs to. This can lead to overheating and a potential fire hazard. Make sure to organize your fridge and avoid overcrowding it.
- 3. Check the electrical cord: Check the electrical cord regularly for any signs of wea and tear, including fraved wires or damaged insulation. If you notice any issues, replace the cord immediately. 4. Keep the area around

crease by 1% or 15%, Council will only set a tax rate to collect the needed \$178,000.

#### The property taxes on every \$100,000 of assessment will be \$803 in 2023 compared to \$790 in 2022. Example, the property taxes on a property in Shuniah with a MPAC assessed value of \$370,000 will be \$2,971 in 2023 compared to \$2,923 in 2022 (this includes both municipal and education taxes).

Municipal council meetings are accessible to the public both virtually and in-person. Budget documents and presentations are available on our website and during the year administration submits reports to Council on variances in expenditures and revenues from budget. RE-MINDER: It's easy to subscribe and receive email notifications of upcoming Council meeting agendas and minutes, Special Meetings, Police Service Board Meetings, Committee of Adjustment meetings and bi-monthly publications of your Shuniah News.

#### Impact of changes to property assessment values:

The Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) is responsible for determining the assessed values of all properties in the Province of Ontario with a province-wide assessment update every four years. The last province-wide assessment update took place in 2016, based on a January 1, 2016, valuation date. Property values were then increased (phased-in) over a 4-year period from 2017 to 2020. Due to COVID, MPAC has postponed the 2020 Assessment Update. Property assessments for the 2021, 2022 and 2023 taxation years will be at a comparable value for 2020 unless there is new construction, renovations or reassessments on individual properties.

The existing decommissioned CN Kinghorn railway line runs approximately 64km through Shuniah Municipality. The line runs parallel to Lakeshore Drive, along the Lake Superior shoreline. Currently the railbed is private property, owned and monitored by the CN. A Rail-to-Trail project highlights the potential for the purchase and conversion of the decommissioned Kinghorn railway into a multi-use, four-season, recreational trail.

Additional information about potentially converting the railbed can be found in the Municipality of Shuniah Parks, Recreation and Facilities Master Plan 2018

Current research of the potential conversion of the railway is being conducted by a thesis student from Lakehead University. The project is seeking to gain community engagement and to understand the public's perceived costs and benefits, and the desired uses of such a trail. This study is independent from the Municipality of Shuniah and is intended for academic purposes.

Since December 1974, LRCA staff have conducted snow surveys in the following three locations: McVicar Creek (Blanchard Street), Pennock Creek (Vibert Road), and Current River (Hazelwood Lake). Snow depth and equivalent water content were near/slightly above average compared to the historical averages for February 15th. Average snow depth was 4% above average (between 40 to 57 centimetres), and average equivalent water content was 24% above average (between 104 to 137 millimetres). Lake Superior's beginning of February level was 19 centimetres above its period-ofrecord (1918-2021) average, and 31 centimetres above the February 2022 level.

Please note that the 2023 Tree Seedling Program has been cancelled. The LRCA and Hill's Greenhouses look forward to returning in 2024.

Believe it or not, but spring is fast approaching, which means that ice conditions will start becoming more unstable. This is a reminder to exercise caution around waterways. The LRCA does not monitor ice conditions in our Conservation Areas; if you plan to go out on the ice, proceed with caution and at your own risk.

Also, be sure to wear appropriate footwear while visiting Conservation Areas. The LRCA does not maintain trails during the winter, so conditions may range from deep snow to icecovered to muddy and wet. With nicer weather on the horizon, visitation to Conservation Areas is going to increase, so we would like to remind visitors to use caution, as natural trails may be uneven and slippery. It's always a good idea to

prepare for how the weather may affect your visit. Be sure to advise others of how long you expect to be in the area, and you should be aware of possible encounters with wildlife. Conservation Areas operate from dawn until dusk. Pets must be onleash at all times. Alcohol is prohib-Conservation Areas. ited in Campfires and overnight camping is also prohibited. Trails are for recreational use only; no bicycles, motorized vehicles, etc. Harvesting of any kind is prohibited. Visitors must adhere to all Conservation Area Rules & Regulations. These regulations are in place to ensure that all visitors to Conservation Areas can enjoy them in a safe, sustainable manner. Thank you for your cooperation, and have fun exploring!

#### Ontario Growing Agri-Food Sector in the North Provincial investment will boost northern economy and food security

SUDBURY – The Ontario government is providing more than \$1.8 million through the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation (NOHFC) to 10 agri-food projects in the North. This investment will boost local food production, create jobs and stimulate expansion and diversification in the northern agri-food sector.

"The agri-food industry continues to have a crucial role in supporting the health and prosperity of our northern communities," said Greg Rickford, Minister of Northern Development. "Our government is committed to expanding access to fresh, locally- produced food, and we are proud to help agri-food businesses become a cornerstone of the Northern Ontario economy."

#### NOHFC funding will go to the following projects:

- \$645,400 for Thunder Bay Agricultural Research Association to install tile drainage on 1,168 acres, which will increase arable land and crop yields
- \$395,400 for Don Poulin Potatoes Inc. to boost their packing capacity, storage space and efficiency to meet the current market demand, help small farmers by providing warehouse access and supply larger markets in Sudbury
- \$200,000 for Marquee Farms to build a 3,200 sq. ft.- controlled environment agriculture facility in Sundridge and buy equipment to grow herbs and leafy greens sustainably year-round that will help address local demand and improve food safety, security and autonomy
- \$200,000 for Martin Agri Services to provide leading-edge equipment and field services currently unavailable on Manitoulin Island and improve on-farm production, efficiency and crop yield, while reducing the carbon footprint of the local agriculture sector
- \$193,638 to Borderlands Farm in Neebing to build the only wool mill of its kind in the North, construct a storage building and buy equipment to produce fresh lamb, wool products and garlic yearround
- \$131,130 to Milford Bay Trout Farm Inc. to build a new processing facility in Parry Sound, with equipment that will increase production capacity to meet high demand, supply new markets and develop unique smoked trout

portunities to bring agriculture back as an economic driver as well," said Lisa Thompson, Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs. "Strategic investments such as these will help the agri-food sector strengthen its roots in the North. This is just one of many actions our government has taken to expand our sector's opportunities to grow, innovate and find new markets."

The NOHFC promotes economic prosperity across Northern Ontario by providing financial assistance to projects—big and small, rural and urban—that stimulate growth, job creation and skills development. Since June 2018, the NOHFC has invested more than \$608 million in 5,070 projects in Northern Ontario, leveraging more than \$1.93 billion in investment and creating or sustaining over 8,100 jobs.
