

Come out and see what your Council is doing on your behalf. Attend in person at the municipal office, or by zoom.

Please contact the Municipal Office for more information or with input into any of the items that Council is considering. This article contains only highlights from Council meetings.

On September 9, 2025, at our Regular Council Meeting, Council received a deputation from the North Superior Workforce Planning Board. Council received a report from the planner regarding an update on the Grann Drive Plan of Subdivision application. Council discussed the Christmas closure for municipal staff and services. Council received information regarding a Municipal Memorial Space, and the FoodCycler program.

On September 23, 2025, at our Regular Council Meeting, Council received a deputation from SolarBank regarding the Battery Energy Storage System open house and Current H2 regarding their Peaker Plant open house. Council decided to schedule a public meeting on October 14 to receive community input on the proposed projects. Council received an update from the Clerk regarding the Lakeshore Developments Vacant Land Condominium Application that is before the Ontario Land Tribunal and an update from the Clerk regarding the Grann Drive Plan of Subdivision update. Council changed the November 11th Council meeting to Wednesday, November 12 and Council discussed attending the 2026 conferences. Council signed the updated Procedural By-law which, among other things, changes the time of the Council Meetings from 4:00pm to 5:00pm.

On October 14, 2025, Council held a Regular Council Meeting, Council received the staff report supporting draft approval of the Grann Drive Plan of Subdivision. Council received and signed the updated Public Library Service Agreement with the City of Thunder Bay and supported the Northern Ontario Resource Development Support (NORDS) pilot program which is to help Northern Ontario municipalities address infrastructure pressures resulting from natural resource sector activities.

On October 14, 2025, a Public Meeting was held by Council to receive community input regarding the Municipal Support Confirmation requested by SolarBank for their Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) and Current H2 regarding their Peaker Plant for their proposal submissions to the Independent Electricity System Operator (IESO) LT2. Municipal staff continue to welcome comments, please contact the Clerk (807-683-4540, clerk@shuniah.org) or the CAO (807-683-4543, cao@shuniah.org) Reminder Council meetings will be held the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of November, and January and the on the 2nd Tuesday of December.

Winter Safety Message

Snow Removal Information:

The following information is provided to assist residents of Shuniah in understanding the Municipalities program for winter maintenance of roads. We hope that this information will also help people appreciate some of the challenges in keeping the roads safe and open for travel.

When a major snowstorm occurs, all drivers throughout the Municipality are faced with deteriorating driving conditions at the same time. Without consideration to the limitations of a snow maintenance operation and regardless of the weather, we understand that drivers expect all roadways to be cleared and safe within the shortest possible period of time. We agree that rapidly cleared roads are very important, both for safe travel, and to facilitate the handling of emergencies by fire, ambulance and police operations.

The plow operators are assigned a designated route, of which may contain several classes of roads- class 3 roads are considered the major routes and class 5 roads are considered the lower volume lightly traveled roads. The routes are designed to clear roads in a systematic way that generally gives priority to class 3 roads and class 4 - 5 collector roads with steep hills and curves. This method also provides the best access for Emergency Services.

The specific course of action (including salting and sanding) will be determined by the Roads Supervisor, depending on snow depth, type of snow, drifting, icy conditions, etc. It is the Municipality's objective to plow all roads within 10 hours of a snowstorm's completion. In cases of heavy snowfalls, accidents, mechanical breakdowns and / or other problems, these objectives may not be met.

Frequently Asked Questions

Why do plows push snow into driveways? Why can't the operator lift the blade in front of my residence?

Answer -Snow must be pushed to the side of the road to clear the road for traffic; all plow trucks are set up to push snow to the right. Sometimes it is necessary to make several passes with the snow-plow during a storm. Other instances may require the banks to be pushed back to allow room for more snow or to allow for drainage during the spring thaw.

Dogs Off-Leash and Licencing: By-Law 1951-98

An important reminder to all dog owners: every dog must be registered annually and the dog tag is to be secured to the dog.

Additionally, every dog owner shall keep the dog leashed and under control of some person when on land that is not owned by the owner of the dog unless the person owning the land has given permission.

Have you visited the little free library posted beside the community gardens at the MacGregor Rec Centre? Come and check out what's in store and find your reading material for the next rainy day! The books are always free - you can bring us your favourites to leave and find new ones for home!

Homes that are located near corners, intersections and cul-de-sacs may receive more snow deposit in driveway entrances than homes located on straight stretches of road, of which is unfortunately unavoidable in most instances.

Why can't the Municipality sand the sides of the road where I walk?

Answer – Roads are maintained for vehicles, not walkers. The sanders are designed with the applicator on the driver's side of the vehicle in order to apply sand to the center of the road.

Mailboxes & Snow

- Mailbox and support posts need to be sturdy enough to handle snow that is dispersed to the roadway edge during plowing operations. If a mailbox is damaged by plowed snow, repair or replacement is the homeowner's responsibility.
- If a mailbox is directly hit by a snowplow blade it will be repaired or replaced by the Municipality with a standard mailbox.

Obstructing the Roadways

Council passed By-law No. 2051-01, which states that, no person shall obstruct or cause any obstruction to any highway, roadway, public lane or bridge within the Municipality. This by-law also indicates that snow, dirt, rubbish or garbage of any kind cannot be placed or plowed onto the roadway and drainage ditches.

Snowmobiling along the CNR Rail Line and Municipal Roadways

Snowmobilers are reminded to adhere to the rules and regulations of the Ontario Highway Traffic Act when enjoying off-road vehicle activities. The former CNR rail bed is privately owned property and should not be used for motorized off-road vehicle useage. Fall Fire Safety Tips and Things to Remember This Season

Fall Fire Safety Tips and Things to Remember this Season.

Lawn Mowers – remove fuel before storing for the winter(you'd be surprised how little this is done)

Vehicles – never park your car or truck on a pile of leaves as the heat from the catalytic convertor or exhaust can ignite the leaves and set your vehicle on fire.

HVAC Maintenance – get your central heating or AC system cleaned, inspected, and serviced by a certified HVAC technician. **Lawn care** – prune back all tress and rake up all leaves and lawn debris. If you live in an open area or have a lot of natural vegetation you may wish to take a closer look at the Fire Smart Program – (Firesmart Begins at Home Guide.ca) or contact the Shuniah Fire Prevention Department for a copy of the 30 page informative guide.

Smoke and Carbon Dioxide Detector – before you turn on your central heating, use your fireplace or wood stove or gas heater amake sure you have enough functioning smoke and CO2 detectors (replace the batteries yearly and if your detector is 10 years old – there's a date stamped on it- get a new one!)

Furnaces and Space Heaters – keep all flammable materials (you'd be surprised what can burn!) away from your furnace. There should be at least 3 feet (1m) of empty space around your space heaters.

Heating Appliance – check your heating appliances - fireplaces, woodstoves, fireplace dampers (does it open and close freely and fully) and chimneys (maybe it's time to clean the chimney) for defects and creosote buildup.

Canada's First Ever Outdoor Judo Tournament and Martial Arts Festival at MacGregor Recreation Centre!

On Saturday September 13, 2025, Shuniah's Kaiju Judo Dojo hosted Canada's first ever outdoor Judo Tournament and Martial Arts Festival at MacGregor Recreation Centre, 800 Lakeshore Drive. Judoka from across Ontario came together for an all ages Shiai and Newaza (Standing and kneeling attack) competition. The tournament used Shuniah's brand new outdoor pavilion located on the east side of Macgregor Recreation Facility providing an outstanding roofed outdoor area that can be used rain or shine; however, the day was warm and sunny not needing participants to hide from the rain.

The tournament commenced with an incredible traditional Gong Ceremony performed by Sensei Jacky Wai Lung Chan of Lac De Mille Lac FN Education Centre. Matthew Roy of Shuniah stated "The sound of the gong resonating with the rustling of the poplars centered our energy and focus before the competition began. So incredibly cool!" The tournament was fast moving with over 120 matches taking place throughout the day.

The event was not only a Judo Tournament but also a celebration of all Martials Arts. From 12:00 to 2:00pm the judo tournament paused for martial arts demonstrations from many different disciplines from across Thunder Bay.

First up was the Thunder Bay Japanese Cultural Association's Kaminari Wan Taiko Drum Group who wowed the audience and surrounding neighbourhood with an incredibly powerful, moving and absolutely beautiful drum and dance performance. "Bringing the traditions of Japanese Culture with the Taiko drumming to a Judo Tournament brought tears to my eyes, I was so moved." said Sandra Greaves, Canadian two-time Judo Olympian, and Thunder Bay Native. The groups that participated were Susan Baldassi's Toshikai Dojo (Isshinryu karate), T-son Douangmala's BJJFourLife, Peng You's International Tai Chi Academy and judo demonstration from Thunder Bay and Mountainside Judo dojos. Having Karate, Brazilian Jiu-jitsu and Tai Chi alongside Judo allowed the audience to compare the styles and traditions of these martial arts, and to wonder at their power and beauty.

"The performances were so exciting and beautiful to watch, and my kids got to participate in many of the demonstrations as well! What a wonderful day at MacGregor Rec!" Martha Dowsley, Shuniah resident.

Concessions were extremely busy all day, serving barbeque, freshbaked giant cookies and pies, snacks, and excellent coffee nonstop. Fantastic Castles were on-site with their largest bouncy castle in Northwestern Ontario thrilling all the young attendees.

We would like to thank our sponsors Hitashita International and Wanson Lumber, and all the volunteers who made this event possible. See everyone again next year!








Shuniah Soil Mates Just Keep Growing!

The harvesting has wrapped up at the Shuniah Soil Mates Community Garden, and as plant life begins to enter their cold season slumber, we'd like to reminisce and appreciate the great offerings of the gardens this year. It has been a season of bounty and of learning, indeed, which invited both sharing and troubleshooting!

While we started off with a dry spring, the summer provided the watering the gardens really needed and gave us lush greenery that was as enjoyable as the produce that was hiding – and eventually bursting out – beneath! Some of it was enjoyed in delicious dishes that were shared at the Soil Mates annual potluck on September 4th - great thanks to all who attended and contributed their cooking and door prize donations, and to John and Janeen Mann for organizing this event once again. It was a wonderful evening of food and visiting, which despite the communal garden space, was the most garden members that may have been gathered all at one time this year. A few weeks later, the Soil Mates history and garden plans were shared at the Thunder Bay District Municipal League meeting by none other than Peter and Diane Tracz. Visitors at this meeting went home with the drawings of the Soil Mates garden boxes that can now be shared with their own communities and others, adding to the many other places in Canada and abroad where these garden box designs have been used. The weather did not favour a garden tour this day, and the end of the season does not best portray the height of the gardening and harvesting, so we'll give you an idea of what this year had in store!

The gardens hosted a great variety of produce this year: carrots, cucumbers, various beans, tomatoes, peas and squashes, beets, onions, lettuce, kale, spinach, brussels sprouts, garlic, potatoes, corn, rhubarb...the list could go on! Carrots, beets, tomatoes and cucumbers seemed to be some favourites among the gardens, which have also lately been a favourite of other visitors as produce began mysteriously disappearing...do not underestimate the superpowers of chipmunks and their annoyingly amazing burrowing habits! Deer fence will not stop these critters, but perhaps a little cinnamon or chili powder will – thanks to the Soil Mates for these tips! This is not to say we are sure the chipmunks didn't have help, and would like to remind folks that the gardens are rented by individuals each year and that the produce that is carefully grown by these gardeners is not free for the taking without their knowing permission. Loon Lake Waterkeepers Conservancy: Underwater Cleanup

The Loon Lake Waterkeepers Conservancy (LLWC) promotes stewardship within the watershed of Loon Lake through education, research and advocacy.

On September 6, the LLWC conducted an underwater cleanup around the West Loon dock and around the area of a former dive tower at East Loon.

We had 12 divers, 2 from Loon Lake and the others from Thunder Bay EcoDivers and Thunder Country Diving, plus 3 pontoon boats.

Some debris was found around the West Loon dock. We recovered an oil drum around the former East Loon Dive Tower. Oil drums were used as floatation for the dock in the 1950s and 1960s. The drum oozed tar, probably 60-year-old coagulated oil, onto the West Loon boat launch, which we picked up. Unfortunately, our oil sample was in a contaminated container, and it could not be tested. Shuniah picked up the drum and debris.

We are planning a side scan sonar survey, and possibly doing sediment core samples of the lake bottom, next summer, which will give us a lake bottom profile; sediments over time; and identify debris and underwater springs. Using this survey, we will find and retrieve other oil drums.

We placed 2 vertical lines with 4 temperature loggers at approximately 5', 10' 15', and 20'. The loggers will record temperatures every 2 hours for over a year. This will help us determine any link between changes in temperature and blue-green algae blooms.



The Longest Night


Here in the northern hemisphere, we're quickly entering those dark and cold days and inching closer to our winter solstice on December 21st – otherwise know as the shortest day, or longest night, of the year! While this is considered the first day of winter, we once again begin to experience growing hours of daylight throughout the winter after this special day. So, what exactly is the winter solstice, and why does it happen?

To get more technical, the winter describes the point in the Earth's orbit around the sun when either hemisphere is angled the furthest away from the sun, rendering less hours of daylight. The difference in our hours of daylight through the year, and thus our seasons here in Canada or places further away from the equator, is a result of the tilted axis that Earth rotates on, which angles us away from the sun in the winter, and toward the sun in the summer. This means that while the northern hemisphere is pointed the furthest away from the sun, the southern hemisphere is pointed the closest to the sun, and while we in the north experience our shortest day of the year, those in the south are enjoying their first day of summer with long daylight hours!

While I am sure many of you, like myself, prefer those long daylight hours that we get during summer, there is something special about being further from the equator and experiencing our four seasons, including winter. I prefer to look on the "bright" side of the darker days, yet beautiful and snowy winters that we get here in Shuniah and Northwestern Ontario! In fact, I must appreciate the amount of daylight that we get here compared to those places that are just a little further north and experience 24 hours of darkness for a portion of their winter, such as Alta, Norway. Once a blanket of white covers the ground and the trees, the sunlight we do get in the winter is just that much brighter, reflecting off the snow and making us dig out our sunscreen – which is not just for summertime! The wintertime opens the opportunity for all the outdoor activities that

we can't do in the summer, like skiing, skating, ice fishing and sledding, among so many others! It also makes us grateful to have the warmth of our homes and gives us an excuse to catch up on crafting and game nights when the weather keeps us in. Don't forget the change in the wildlife scene when winter comes, making for stunning photography and maybe even a sighting of a snowy owl if you get really lucky!

So, what will you do to celebrate the longest night of the year? You might even want to check out when the next meteor shower is or when the northern lights might put on a show, which are spectacular on a dark, cold and clear night! Just remember to bundle up with proper layers, tell someone where you might be adventuring off to, and wear bright and reflective layers to be visible during the dark nights. There's no need to be afraid of the dark this winter solstice!


Volunteer Leaders are working to expose the girls to a range of activities and inspirational women in the community, encouraging the girls to dream big and give back to their community.

- feeding animals near roads increases their risk of being hit by vehicles





Threats to people

- animals will learn to associate humans with food, and can become a problem to neighbours
- habituated animals can become aggressive



Water Testing Reminder

The Thunder Bay District Health Unit...

...recommends "regular testing of your private well is important to make sure your water is safe for you and your family to drink. Bacteria such as E. coli can contaminate your well making is unsafe to drink. The risk is higher if you have animals in the area, but the bacteria can also occur naturally in the soil."

Heavy rainfalls or flooding? Additional testing is recommended as there is a greater risk of surface water washing into your well (drilled or dug).

How to get a kit?

Free bacterial testing is available for private well owners through Ontario's Public Health Laboratory (the Lab), located at 336 South Syndicate Avenue. The Lab does not test for other contaminants, such as chemicals. Free bacterial testing kits are available for pick up at the Municipal Office at 420 Leslie Avenue.

Water samples submitted for bacterial testing to Ontario's Public Health Laboratory are not tested for metals or chemical contaminants that could affect the safety of drinking water.

It is recommended that homeowners have their well water tested for nonbacterial environmental contaminants by a private laboratory approximately every five years.

Please be advised that the dumping of hazardous waste, garbage, and engine oil into outhouses in Conservation Areas is prohibited. It has come to our attention that this has been occurring at Little Trout Bay Conservation Area; excessive garbage is also being dumped into the composting toilets at Mission Island Marsh Conservation Area. As a result, the costs associated with pumping and repairs have increased and will impact the LRCA's available funds for maintaining and operating Conservation Areas. It is also advised that the dumping of residential waste/garbage bags at Conservation Areas is also prohibited. This is a regular occurrence at Silver Harbour, MacKenzie Point, Mills Block and Wishart Conservation Areas. Failure to comply with the above-mentioned prohibited activities could result in fines as per Ontario Regulation 688/21: Rules of Conduct in Conservation Areas. The LRCA's Provincial Offences Officers will continue to monitor the situation.

The 2026 Explore Card Parking Pass will be available for sale beginning November 1, 2025! If you visit frequently, an Explore Card Parking Pass for \$40.00 +HST permits day-use/parking at our ten Conservation Areas for one calendar year. Visit as often as you like.
